

Happy Spring Trinity!

While the current weather forecast (3-5 inches of snow in the next 48 hours) is not feeling very spring-like, all the activities inside the school are pointing directly toward SpRiNg! We are in the midst of enrollment season and planning for the new school year.

It is not very often that I will ever talk about politics, but this week I joined other principals in Policy Day for Non-Public Schools in Lansing, hosted by the Michigan Association of Non-Public Schools (MANS). Seeing how things work and all that our representatives are dealing with was an eye-opening experience. I am sometimes very discouraged by the news when all I hear is what is going against the parochial schools in our state (and country in general). I was able to be a part of meetings with 2 state representatives, Tim Beson & Matthew Bierlein, and was very encouraged by the work they do and their deep support of Christian education. Representative Bierlein's children attend Lutheran a school and shared with us that the most important thing we can do is to "pay attention to who we vote into office" and to be bold and persistent in sharing the needs of our schools. The common misconception is that children who attend private / Christian schools do not have the same needs as public school children - and that is simply untrue.

I feel it is important for our members and families to understand some of the changes that are being proposed. The following is a sampling of appropriations that have previously been included in the state budget for non-public schools, but are not part of the proposed 2025 budget. These are talking points shared during our meetings with representatives.

- Equitable Treatment of Nonpublic Schools: A number of policy and budget issues impact the operation and vitality of nonpublic schools. From school safety and security to shared time funding and teacher certification, Michigan's nonpublic schools feel the impact of decisions made in Lansing. MANS urges the Legislature to consider the impact of policy and budget decisions on Michigan's nonpublic schools and their 100,000+ students. Public policy decisions should be made with the best interest of all of Michigan's students in mind, no matter where they attend school.
- School Safety Funding the last 2 years have included \$18,000,000 appropriation for school safety and mental health initiatives. MANS urges the legislature to reinstate funding for school safety for Michigan's nonpublic school.

- Health & Safety Mandates The State of MIchigan has paced a number of health, safety and welfare regulations upon ALL Michigan schools. Public schools are compensated for these regulations through the per pupil foundation allowance. The 2017 & 2018 School Aid Budgets included \$2.5 million to reimburse nonpublic schools. In 2019 the amount appropriated was \$250,000; there was \$1 million provided in the 22-23 AND 23-24 school years. There is no appropriation in the proposed 2025 budget. MANS urges the legislature to support reinstatement of funding for this purpose in the 2024-25 School Aid budget for the purpose of reimbursing nonpublic schools for performing requirements that keep Michigan students safe.
- Student Teacher Stipend Program the proposed budget includes the provision of up the \$9,600 per semester for students attending teacher preparation college programs. The student must student-teach in a public school to receive the stipend. MANS urges the legislature to include the ability for student teachers to complete their student teaching in a nonpublic school this making the playing field even between public school and nonpublic schools that are both suffering the impact of a teacher shortage.
- Michigan Future Educator Fellowship Program this program freely provides up to \$10.000 per year for students seeking to be a PreK-12 teacher (up to \$20.000) and who teach at a public school for 3-5 years post-graduation. Teachers who take positions in non-public schools will not qualify and will need to repay the fellowship. MANS urges the legislature to include the option of subsequently teaching at a nonpublic school to avoid repayment of the fellowship funding.

In closing I would like to say that regardless of our government leadership, our King is in control. We have a responsibility to pray for the government - whether we agree or disagree with the politics. Please pray for our leaders to make God pleasing decisions and that our schools, teachers, students and families would not be excluded in their decision making processes.
