

#### **Stewardship Minute**

#### Blessings through our Giving

God sets no boundaries on His giving to us. In the words of Martin Luther, "He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life." (Martin Luther's Small Catechism). In response to God's great love for us and His bountiful gifts to us, we are enabled by grace to share with others the wealth He has given us. God uses us as conduits of His love and His goodness so that no one has to be in need.

Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35). We don't give to be blessed, but God's Word clearly tells us that through our faithful generosity God will bless us. Jesus makes giving more than giving when we give to help those in need.



In his book *Money Is Everything*, Herb Miller shares a humorous story about how we get back more than what we invest:

A young intern came into a hospital nursing station one evening shaking his head. "There is an old man in the lobby by the vending machines," he said, "and he's putting dollar bills into the money changer. Every time he gets his quarters, he yells 'Jackpot!' and dances around." A few hours later, the nurses on their way to a coffee break saw a repairman fixing a vending machine. When they asked why he was working so late, he said, "I have to get this money changer fixed. It's been giving \$1.50 in quarters every time someone puts in a dollar bill."

When we give to those in need, we receive something much better than some extra quarters. God blesses us spiritually and at times materially when we give faithfully. Through our generosity, we receive God's peace and joy. May we all experience the joy in giving.

#### **Stewardship Corner**

#### The Parable of the Rice Field

There is a parable told in India about the selfish man who inherited a rice field. The first year the man irrigated the field and it was fruitful. The water, in fact, flowed onto his neighbor's field and this too produced a bountiful harvest.

But the next year the selfish man decided: Why should I let this water flow through my field into his? Water is precious and I must keep it. So he built a dam. This prevented the water from flowing into his neighbor's field; but, it proved disastrous to his own



crop as well. Irrigation water nourished the field only if it flowed. When it did not move, because of the dam, the water became stagnant and the field a swamp.

We own no rice fields. Still, the parable is clear. Think of what we have inherited from God; think of all He has given us. If we are selfish and keep it all for ourselves, our lives become stagnant, a dismal swamp of mere existence. But if we give back to God by giving to others, both the giver and the receiver share in the fruits of God's love.



#### **DISTRICT CONVENTION**



Well, we are home! The 80th LWML Michigan District Convention is over. What a busy three days we had! From the moment of registration on Thursday morning, we were busy with delegate meetings, servant projects, choir practice until the Opening Communion Worship Service at St. Lorenz that evening. Friday was a day filled with convention business

sessions where delegates voted on financial issues, election of officers, and the selection of Mission Grants to be funded this year. We had Bible Study sessions as well as enjoying the lunch "break out" sessions with different speakers. For the LWML members here at Trinity, convention was different this year. Trinity is a member of the Bay Area Zone of the LWML and we, along with the members of the Timberline Zone and the Mid Michigan Zone, were host to the convention. This required us to be there Wednesday evening to help with set up and last minute issues. Saturday began with the Mission Walk, business sessions, speakers, and installations of the new officers. The day ended with the closing "Sending Service". The Servant Events are always enjoyed and this year 38 sleeping mats for the homeless (made from plastic bags) were completed and will be donated to the Franklin Street Mission in Flint. 50 lap blankets were made for PHIL'S FRIENDS, an organization that supplies these blankets along with other items to people receiving chemotherapy for cancer. A multitude of used postage stamps were sorted and trimmed and will be turned into cash with the proceeds going to Becky Grossmann of Lutheran Bible Translators. 235 eyeglass cases were made for MOST Ministries. These will be used with the eyeglasses that have been donated for MOST Mission trips. So many big accomplishments happened in the small town of Frankenmuth!

During the business sessions, it was announced that enough money was collected to fund ALL of the 2020-2022 mission grants. TO GOD BE THE GLORY!!! It was also proposed that the mission grant budget for the 2022-2024 biennium be increased to \$275,000.00 which will be used to fund the mission grants that were recently selected by the Executive Committee and approved by the President of the LCMS. Out of the list presented to the delegates, 14 grants were chosen. Some of these grants are local and some are in other countries, but the results are "far reaching". What a big challenge this will be for the Michigan District! With your help on Mite Box Sunday we can meet this goal. Even the smallest donation makes our Mites very MIGHTY!!! We found out how mighty these Mites are as we listened to a number of missionaries tell us how the grants they received helped change lives and actually saved lives. We learned how a two-way radio purchased with Mite funds saved the life of a three and a half week old son of a missionary in Peru. We learned how Mite money helped build a place called Mission Central in rural Iowa where thousands of people come every year to learn more about our Savior, Jesus. We learned how LAMP (Lutheran Association of Missionaries and Pilots) serve the mission field that is inaccessible by roads in Northern Canada and Alaska with their mission grant of \$25,000.00. It was so amazing to hear how God uses our "pocket change" to accomplish so much in the lives of people who would, otherwise, never come to know Him and be saved.

So, yes, we are home with many wonderful memories! Yes, Frankenmuth was, indeed, purple for a few days. Now it is time to move on. Time, not just for the "Ladies In Purple" to Serve The Lord With Gladness, but for all of us to work together to pray for our missionaries and collect our Mites for their work. It is through the Lord's divine guidance that this work of saving souls can be done. we are led to sing:

Praise GOD From Whom All Blessings Flow Praise Him All Creatures Here Below Praise Him Above Ye Heavenly Host Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.

We are grateful for the many ways that God has blessed Camp Lu Lay Lea this summer. As many of you know, we were unable to have our usual summer camp activities the previous two years. That created some challenges for us, but God is good! He provided a wonderful group of directors, counselors, program staff, kitchen staff, and volunteers this summer as we welcomed back campers for seven weeks of fun, fellowship, and growing in faith.



Being unable to have camp in 2020 and 2021 did have a significant impact on our finances. We were able to weather that storm and open for 2022 with a budget that was fiscally responsible but did not have much room for unexpected costs. During the beginning of our last week at camp, COVID-19 caused us to shut things down and send our campers home. We were able to refund registrations for the families that week, but it has crippled our cash reserves.

We are writing to the congregations that have supported Camp Lu Lay Lea over the years with their time, talents, and treasures. It is our hope that you can share this letter with the families in your congregation, asking them to pray for the ministry of Camp Lu Lay Lea and to provide any financial blessing in support of camp. The Board is seeking +\$20,000 of donations to give us the ability to get through the months ahead and be ready to open for the summer of 2023.
